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1 PROCEEDINGS 2. (Recording of the meeting began at 3:30 p.m.) MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: I'm going to call the 3 4 meeting to order. Good afternoon, everyone. 5 DR. BENDROSS-MINDINGALL: Good afternoon. 6 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: It's good to see all of you 7 today. It looks like we might be setting up a few 8 board members. Let's give it just another minute. I 9 think I see some directions taking place. All right, 10 I think we are good to go. 11 Good afternoon, Jim. 12 Welcome. We are ready to start our meeting. 13 Today is May 7th (sic), I'd like to send a warm 14 welcome to everybody that is joining us by Zoom, or 15 if you're here in-person today, it's good to see all of you for our May 6, 2021. 16 17 MS. JEANTY: Hello? Hello? 18 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Hello. 19 MS. JEANTY: Can you hear me, Pam? Okay. Hold 2.0 on. 21 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, Muriel, I can hear you. 22 MS. JEANTY: Okay. Jim is going to say a few 23 words to you. Hold on. 24 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Oh, okay. Very well. Hey, 25 Jim.

MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, I'm sorry, we had technical difficulties. If we can just have a moment, Dane wants to go through some discussion items for the people who are here internally in the Ryder Room, just to give some -- we just need one minute for some instructions.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Absolutely.

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MR. HAJ: Dane, thank you. And, Dane, for those of you who remember, is our employee of the year.

Dane, thank you for everything.

Madam Chair, just to recap for those who are not in the room but may be here for the board meeting, there was an ask from the board members, is there a way, when the agenda is posted, to scroll up and down, which we weren't able to do last board meeting, so we found a fix and Jane was just explaining to those people who are here in person.

And that is the approval of the April 8th, 8 2021 committee minutes. I'm sure by now, committee 9 10 members, you've had an opportunity to review the 11 minutes. 12 May I have a motion to approve, please? 13 DR. BENDROSS-MINDINGALL: So moved, Bendross-14 Mindingall. 15 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Dorothy. 16 And, Karen, can we do the second with you? 17 MS. WELLER: I'll second. 18 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: All those in favor? 19 ALL: Aye. 2.0 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Any opposed? 21 The minutes are approved. Thank you very much. 22 We have a packed agenda with, I think it's an even dozen resolutions today, so we're going to dive 23 24 right in. 25 Our first Resolution is 2021-A. I have to

DUNN: So moved, Richard Dunn. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. 10 11 And a second? 12 DR. BAGNER: Second, Bagner. 13 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. 14 Are there any recusals? 15 MS. NEASMAN: Yes, this is Annie Neasman, I have 16 to recuse myself. 17 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Other recusals? 18 MS. GIMENEZ: Lourdes Gimenez, I'm recusing 19 myself as well. 2.0 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. That's two more 21 Any other recusals, please? recusals. 22 Okay, hearing none, moving into discussion. 23 I'll provide a brief overview of these 14 -- this 24 resolution which features 14 Family and Neighborhood 25 Support Partnerships. These partnerships offer

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comprehensive and individualized supports for children, youth and their families who are experiencing challenges that limit them from realizing their full potential. These 14 providers include a full array of community-based programs and other funding agencies that work together to strengthen the system of care.

Committee members, you will note that all these partnerships include funds for family emergencies such as food insecurity, job loss, eviction, termination, et cetera. The current recommendations for an additional 12-month term are based on staff assessment of programs through observation of activities and reviews of performance data. Virtual service delivery using online and telehealth platform was included in the community-based supports and they help to build, strength and protect factors.

This is a county-wide program and these programs recruited on average, 138 percent of the required families. They collectively worked with 1,808 families with 33 percent of those families reporting at least one child with one or more disabilities.

And you'll note that there's also a map included in your pamphlet.

Moving into discussion, comments, observations

Resolution 2021-B: 6 Authorization to negotiate and execute contract 7 renewals with eight providers, identified herein, for 8 Family Strengthening services, in a total amount not 9 to exceed \$3,796,514.00, for a term of 14 months, 10 commencing August 1, 2021, and ending September 30, 2022, with one remaining 12-month renewal, subject to 11 12 annual funding appropriations. 13 May I have a motion, please? 14 MS. GIMENEZ: So moved, Gimenez. 15 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. And a second? 16 DR. BENDROSS-MINDINGALL: Bendross-Mindingall. 17 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any 18 recusals? DR. BAGNER: Bagner, employed by FIU. 19 2.0 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Dan. Other 21 recusals? MS. NEASMAN: Annie Neasman with Jessie Trice. 22 23 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Ms. Neasman. 24 Recusals? All right, that sounds like that's 25 it. So let's move into discussion. As you're aware,

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the Family Strengthening initiative is a crosscutting funding approach that focuses on families with children and youth experiencing challenges such as disruptive child behavior, tumultuous parent/child relationship, et cetera.

These evidence-based individualized parenting and clinical intervention services are accessible in the community and home environments to support a full array of families. Clinical intervention services are implemented individually in homes and other therapeutic and virtual settings with families and their children ages 2 to 18, and they also include a comprehensive needs assessment.

The most recent program performance ratings available from before the COVID-19 pandemic indicate most programs were performing at or beyond contractual expectations. The programs in question here are listed on page 8 in your packet and the evidence-based approach programs that they use are listed there also. On average, 82 percent of required families were recruited. Families that were served, 377. And of those families, there was 63 percent reporting one or more child with one or more disabilities.

Moving into discussion, the floor is open,

DONWORTH: So moved, Donworth. 16 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Dorothy. 17 And a second? 18 MR. DUNN: Second, Richard Dunn. 19 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any 2.0 recusals? 21 DR. BAGNER: Bagner, employed by FIU. 22 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Dan. 23 Other recusals? MS. NEASMAN: Annie Neasman with Jessie Trice. 24 25 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Ms. Neasman.

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Are those the only two recusals? Okay. No further recusals, let's move into discussion. This is a contract renewal for 40 providers and it funds for a continuum evidence based and promising programs that support parents and families in the evitable challenges they face. This includes group, advocacy home visitation and individual supports.

Some of the group based advocacy programs emphasize parent leadership development, specific engagement, allowing parents to become more engaged in child serving systems and advocating for their own children's success and for improved family-centered services. On average, the required numbers or percentages of family required to be recruited is 119 percent. Families served, 3,418, and of those families, 33 percent reported having one or more children with one or more disabilities. And the program by program breakdown is on page 18 in your packet.

Discussion, comments from the committee?

MR. DUNN: I believe I vaguely remember this resolution from before and I raised the question, but

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just for my comfort, even though I did move for it to be passed and I'm still supportive, I would like to be reminded of the majority of ZIP codes that are being served, is that on page 18 and 19, you just mentioned? Does it list the areas, the zones that are serviced by this current team of services? I'm not --

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: I'm not sure if that's included in the program breakdown. May I have some help from Jim or the staff? I don't recall ZIP codes here.

MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, we don't have that in the packet, but, Pastor, we'll be happy to get that for you.

MR. DUNN: Okay, well, thank you. What about -I'm seeing some of the agencies, could we see the
list of the agencies? That would help me be able to
ascertain the sum of the ZIP codes, if I can look at
some of the agencies that are affiliated with this
resolution.

MS. HANSON: While they scroll to the list of agencies, can you go to the list that's in the Reso with the dollar amounts. Go up, please.

Pastor Dunn I would just let you know that in this past year, many of the services have been

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conducted using Telehealth technology because of the shutdown and limitation on in-person services. Usually we do have a map with this resolution. We don't have one this time because so many of the majority of services that were funded, were provided virtually. So if you'd like, in addition to seeing this list of agencies here, we could also follow up and send you the map from last year, which would kind of give you an idea of the representation of where the services were delivered when they were majority in-person. MR. DUNN: Okay, thank you very much. perusing over the agencies now and I'm satisfied with some of the agencies that I see in terms of making sure those fair areas that are most needed for this type of service, a parenting servicing would be So I'm satisfied with what I see thus far. provided. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Pastor Dunn. Thank you Lori. Further comments, questions from the committee? Hearing none, all those in favor? ALL: Aye. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The resolution carries. Resolution 2021-D: Authorization to negotiate

1 and execute contract renewals with Be Strong 2. International, Inc., Florida International University (FIU), and University of Miami (UM), to deliver brief 3 4 parenting workshops and educational or public health 5 events, in a total amount not to exceed 6 \$1,183,852.00, for a term of 14 months, commencing 7 August 1, 2021, and ending September 30, 2022, with 8 one remaining 12-month renewal, subject to annual 9 funding appropriations. 10 May I have a motion, please? 11 MS. NEASMAN: So moved, Annie. 12 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. And a second? 13 DR. ABRAHAM: Second, Ed Abraham. 14 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Do we have any 15 recusals? DR. BAGNER: One more time, Bagner, employed by 16 17 FIU. 18 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: We've heard a lot from you 19 today, Dan, thank you. 2.0 Any other recusals, please? 21 Okay, let's move into discussion. Very briefly, we do know that brief universal interventions can 22 23 offer an effective low-cost way to reach large and 24 diverse groups of primary caregivers, who might not

otherwise receive parenting education. And thus, The

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Children's Trust Parent Club was launched in September 2019 and provides brief evidence-based parenting workshops delivered in English, Spanish and Haitian Creole for diverse groups of primary caregivers across Miami-Dade County to enhance awareness and knowledge for parents with children birth to age 18. It's offered in a combination of in-person, virtual, and one-on-one sessions, and topics address common parenting strategies for parents of all abilities. And information is also available about community resources.

The Parent Club has achieved 2,105 workshops at 224 unique locations, with 93 percent of participants reporting that they gained skills that they can put into practice. The Parent Club has touched 8,187 parents, with an average attendance of 3.9 percent, with 93 percent reporting positive perceptions of the presenters.

The floor is open for discussion, observations, questions from the committee.

Hearing none, all those in favor?

ALL: Aye.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?

The resolution carries.

Resolution 2021-E: Authorization to negotiate

and execute contract renewals with Training and Implementation Associates and the University of Miami, for program and professional development (PPD) support services for The Children's Trust's family services providers and staff, in a total amount not to exceed \$500,000.00, for a term of 12 months, commencing October 1, 2021, and ending September 30, 2022, with one remaining 12-month renewal, subject to annual appropriations.

May I have a motion please?

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MS. GIMENEZ: So moved, Gimenez.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. And a second?

MS. NEASMAN: Second, Annie.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any recusals?

Hearing none, let's move into discussion. This resolution provides for quality supports for 55 Trust funded family service providers, with an aim to support meaningful and measurable results for parents, children and families, and consistently deliver high quality services in alignment with best practices and effectively and efficiently satisfying The Children's Trust contract requirements.

The two entities work collaboratively to implement PPD supports that include best practices

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related to family services, wraparound care and care coordination. Including online course creation, administrative and direct service staff coaching, peer learning activities, community awareness and outreach, planning policy support and input.

The funding amount for this contract is lower than the prior year because the contract term is for 14 months to align with The Children's Trust fiscal year. The annual funding allocation for this resolution remains the same.

Discussion, questions from the committee?
Hearing none, all those in favor?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?
The resolution carries.

Authorization to negotiate and execute a contract renewal with Miami Dade College for The Children's Trust Books for Free program, in a total amount not to exceed \$400,000.00, for a term of 12 months, commencing October 1, 2021, and ending September 30, 2021. I think that's a typo, it should be 2022. With one remaining 12-month renewal, subject to annual funding appropriations.

May I have a motion, please?

DR. BENDROSS-MINDINGALL: Move it, Bendross-

ALL: Aye.

Mindingall.

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MR. DUNN: Second, Richard Dunn.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Very good.

Recusals?

Hearing none, moving into discussion. This
Books For Free program ensures young children have
access to books to take home and keep at no cost from
bookshelves that are placed in public spaces
throughout our community. Miami-Dade College
distributes the books through 65 bookshelves
maintained in public places. Now, with the COVID-19
shutdown, Books for Free adjusted and created an
online content for users. This program year, many of
the bookshelf locations resumed operations and
community -- as community restrictions have been
lifted.

For locations that were impacted by long-term closures, replacement sites have been identified. The Miami-Dade College extended its distribution level to include barbershops and laundromats through participation with the Kiwanis Club. During the first six months of the contract year, Miami-Dade College has successfully maintained 48 out of the 65 contracted bookshelf sites, collected and distributed 66,873 books, provided 19 individual community

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partner book donations, and provided more than a 50 percent in-kind match to the program, valued at \$212,338.00. And that is over and above the required 15 match.

And you will see in your packet, a map of the Books for Free locations around the county.

Discussion, questions from the committee, please?

DR. BAGNER: I do have a question about overlap between this -- I certainly think this is an excellent initiative. Overlap between this and the other book club, which is a huge initiative, in terms of overlapping age, overlapping types of books. I want to make sure that both hands are talking to one another in these initiatives for reading.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Dan. Do we have a staff member, Jim, that could provide some information here?

MR. HAJ: Sure. Lori, please.

MS. HANSON: Sure. Yes, the Miami-Dade College people are actually part of the book club community advisory committee, so Lissette Martinez does engage with us. There is some collaboration. We also, I believe, Stephanie will confirm this, if I'm right, but when we get book returns for the book club, we

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actually have a process where we use those to give them to Miami-Dade College to stock the bookshelves, so we're really are trying to use the synchronicity across the programs.

There's also been a rebranding. I think if Gimenez is on, she would say that we've been rebranding what the bookshelves look like, to ensure that the book club is being promoted at the bookshelf, so that not only can a child take a book from the bookshelf, that they also can sign up to get, if they're under five still, they can sign up to get a monthly book mailed to them through the book club. So we definitely are integrating those efforts.

DR. BAGNER: Great, thank you.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Lori. I like the reference to synchronicity, that's one of my favorite words. Thank you.

Further discussions, questions from our committee, please?

- MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: I have a question.
- MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, Tiombe.
- MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: The books are in the three languages that are most spoken in our district, correct -- I mean, not district, in our county, is

that correct?

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, that is correct.

MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: Okay, so I guess the other thing I wanted to mention is just a comment. I think this is a great initiative because literacy, obviously, is extremely important, but I'm going to emphasize, again, if we have books in multiple languages, then I think as The Trust, we need to consider advocating for children to become literate in the very languages that they are receiving books I think its -- I don't know, I'm not sure of the proper word I should say, but if we have a child whose native language is Spanish or their native language is Haitian-Creole, for example, and they're taking these books, but they don't have instruction in those languages, as far as reading, right, because oral language is important, but is so is also becoming literate in reading in those languages. And I think that is something that we have to consider. We don't want them to only understand the stories through oral language, but we want them to also be literate.

They go together, and again, this will help with the acquisition of English once they get into school. So I just wanted to mention that, the literacy is

1 important, not just hearing the stories, but 2. understanding how to read the language and write the 3 language. 4 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes. Thank you, Tiombe. 5 Further input from the committee, please? Hearing none, all those in favor? 6 7 ALL: Aye. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? 8 The resolution carries. 9 10 Resolution 2021-G: Authorization to negotiate 11 and execute a single source contract with Miami Dade 12 Family Learning Partnership for Reach Out and Read, 13 early literacy programming, in a total amount not to 14 exceed \$355,664.00, for a term of 12 months, 15 commencing October 1, 2021, and ending September 30, 16 2022. 17 May I have a motion, please? 18 MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: So moved, Kendrick-Dunn. 19 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. 2.0 DR. BAGNER: Second, Bagner. 21 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Bagner, thank you. 2.2 Are there any recusals? 23 Okay, hearing none, let's move into discussion. 24 As you are aware, Reach Out and Read is a evidence 25 based model that has been funded by The Trust since

2015. This is a national model endorsed by the American Academy of Pediatrics and it champions the positive effects of reading daily and engaging in other language rich activities with our children.

The program provides families with children six months to five years of age with developmentally appropriate books in English, Spanish and Haitian-Creole, accompanied by pediatrician guidance about reading out loud. Reach Out and Read is provided in primary pediatric care settings, and Reach Out and Read Clinic populations must include at least half uninsured or publicly insured patients.

The Miami-Dade Family Learning partnership has partnered with 70 pediatric clinics across the county to distribute nearly 55,000 books between July 2019 and June 2020. And you will see a map that indicates the Reach Out and Read locations in your packet, committee members.

Feedback, discussion from our committee?
Hearing none, all those in favor?

ALL: Aye.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?
The resolution carries.

Resolution 2021-H: Authorization to negotiate and execute a contract with the Public Health Trust

of Miami-Dade County, d/b/a Jackson Health System, in partnership with the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine, to implement Miami's Injury Free Coalition for Kids, in a total amount not to exceed \$408,000.00, for a term of 12 months, commencing October 1, 2021, and ending September 30, 2022.

May I have a motion, please?

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MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: So moved, Kendrick-Dunn.

DR. BAGNER: Second, Bagner.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay, we have a first and a second. Are there any recusals?

Hearing none, and moving into discussion. These services aim to reduce unintentional child and youth injuries through multilingual interactive services.

Over the last year, the coalition continued working closely with Trust staff to strengthen its role in supporting Trust funded partners and providing training for parents, caregivers and youth.

Inside of the COVID-19 pandemic and community shutdown, PHT was only able to provide 9 of its 116 contracted trainings to 781 adults using a virtual format. The injury free coalition developed a new service delivery and engagement plan that includes hiring a marketing agency to create and deploy a marketing social media plan to strengthen its online

presence and to raise overall community awareness.

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The coalition will work with The Children's

Trust to -- in the National Coalition, to develop an evaluation for self-assessment and continuous quality improvement. You'll recall that there is an injury free 40-foot mobile unit and we are expecting a soft launch of that in 2021. And that will travel throughout Miami-Dade for events and scheduled visits. And you can find the full array of contracted services, there are far too many for me to mention here, on pages 39 and 40 in your packet.

Committee members, discussion, questions?

DR. BAGNER: I do want to commend The Trust for this effort. Every year I think I say this, but injuries, unintentional injuries is a leading cause of death in kids, so we can't do enough of this. And I also want to commend The Trust for the asking gun safety addition that they put in there. I know that's something I brought up year and year and I was really pleased to see that initiative. It's so important. So I commend The Trust for putting this together.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Dan.

Further feedback from our committee?

MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, if I may. We also

received pictures today, this mobile unit is coming online. This is one of the buses. As you recall, probably about a year, two years ago, we brought all the mobile units and stuck them across the street for our board meeting, for everybody to go in. This was the one unit that has not come online, but we will share pictures either prior to the board meeting or at the board meeting of the new unit as it starts rolling out. And I think, Juliette, what, next month? It's not April, I think they're a little delayed. Next month or two it's going to be.

MS. FABIEN: Early June or July. I mean, late June or early July, I'm sorry.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Very well. Thank you both for sharing. We look forward to that. Exciting news.

Further discussion prior to the vote?

All those in favor?

ALL: Aye.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?

The resolution carries.

Resolution 2021-I: Authorization to negotiate and execute a contract with Miami-Dade County for the HERO truancy prevention program, a component of the Case Management Referral Program, in a total amount

not to exceed \$880,000.00, for a term of 12 months, commencing August 1, 2021, and ending July 31, 2022.

DR. BENDROSS-MINDINGALL: Bendross-Mindingall, move it.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. And a second?

MS. NEASMAN: Second, Annie.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any recusals?

Hearing none, moving into discussion. Here Everyday Ready On-time is a funded collaboration. It's a truancy prevention program. This program is part of the Together for Children Strategy, which is a neighborhood driven coalition working in three geographic regions in Miami-Dade County, north central and south, spanning 20 ZIP codes.

While the COVID-19 pandemic challenged the effectiveness of the program during the 2021 school year, still, a total of 16,495 elementary school children were contacted across the 39 schools, of which 8,539 participated in the HERO truancy program due to response to intervention model. A total of 832 home visits were conducted and 937 families participated in truancy child study team meetings. 804 referrals were made to service providers. And there is a very impressive infographic of services

and results starting on page 44 in your packet.

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Feedback, questions, observations from the committee?

DR. BENDROSS-MINDINGALL: Madam Chair?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, ma'am?

DR. BENDROSS-MINDINGALL: I'd like to make some remarks on this one. This is an issue near and dear to my heart as a former principal of Lillie Carmichael Evans Elementary School, where about 99 percent of my children lived in public housing. If they did not come to school, I went to their homes and got them. It worked beautifully. I wanted to share some remarks that I scribd it.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, please.

MS. BENDROSS-MNDINGALL: Thank you, Madam Chair.

With regard to recent health concerns surrounding the pandemic, it was necessary, of course, to pivot to dual modality and distance learning. I'm thankful that we are thriving in our efforts to return to some sense of normalcy as we now have several vaccines available. And while I'm on that point, I'd like to thank one of our, I guess you would say, cohorts, Annie Neasman, who did a phenomenal job at Jessie Trice. So I want to give her a shout-out on that.

But I want to say that I appreciate Resolution 2021 because it provides solutions, it also provides opportunities for all parties involved to cooperate. There's so much more that I wrote, Madam Chair, but in light of time, I will only say that, again, this is one of, I won't say my favorite resolutions, but it probably is at this time. So if we talk about next year, I'm all for that. But if we don't receive, if this issue doesn't receive the proper attention, we'll have repercussions for years to come.

Thank you, Madam Chair.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you very much.

Further observations, questions from the committee?

MR. DUNN: Madam Chair?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, Pastor Dunn?

MR. DUNN: I would be remised if I did not ditto what my colleague governing board member, Bendross-Mindingall echoed in terms of she actually did it. A lot of times we talk about it, but she did it. And just to prove the point, many of her parents who were in those situations, ended up going back to school, getting their college degrees and now they have children who went to college because of her efforts.

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And I'll just say this, Madam Bendross-Mindingall, I was just speaking with Mr. Lamarc Anderson, he works with me, and he was so happy. He tickled me how he said he thought he was going to sit back and cross his legs and you told him to put on his walking boots. So I know you remember that. I know it was years ago, but you didn't even know your name was being mentioned. So I would be remised if I did not give my kudos to you for going, what they call, literally, "boots on the ground."

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you.

DR. BENDROSS-MINDINGALL: Madam Chair, let me -thank you so much, Reverend Dunn. You're always dear
and for those of us who are spiritually bound, we
don't know when you're going to speak, but you're
always on time.

MR. DUNN: Wow. That's huge coming from you.

MS. BENDROSS-MENDINGALL: Thank you.

MR. DUNN: It's true though, it's true.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you to you both.

Further input from our committee today?

MS. NEASMAN: Madam Chair, its Annie Neasman, and I just want to also say thank you to school board member Mindingall for giving that shout-out to the Jessie Trice Community Health System. I know we all

know about the vaccines, but every opportunity I get, I know Karen will agree with me, we encourage the vaccines and they are readily available in most places now, but we certainly would encourage you. At every opportunity, this is one of the tools in our toolbox. And we certainly will continue to be there to provide that to this community and the communities we serve. So thank you all.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you very much. Thanks to you all. So going back to this resolution, and thank you for that robust discussion.

All those in favor?

ALL: Aye.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Any opposed?

The resolution carries.

Resolution 2021-J: Authorization to enter into a purchase agreement with University of Miami

Department of Pediatrics to support the Pediatric

Mobile Clinic in providing comprehensive health

services throughout Miami-Dade County, in a total

amount not to exceed \$100,000.00, for a term of 12

months, commencing June 1, 2021, and ending on July

31, 2022.

May I have a motion, please?

DR. BENDROSS-MINDINGALL: Move it, Bendross-

Mindingall.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. And a second?

MS. WELLER: Second, Weller.

MS HOLLINGSWORTH: Is that Weller for second?

MS. WELLER: Yes.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any recusals?

Okay, hearing none, this resolution between UM, the Pediatric Mobile Clinic, aims to reduce health care disparities by providing comprehensive medical care to underserved children. And it furthermore promotes a healthy lifestyle through education and the communities served, until families can secure

permanent long-term health care coverage.

One of the many highlights here is the Shots To Go Program, which follows the CDC recommended vaccine schedule, to offer children vaccines free of charge with parental consent. Now, a similar process will be followed when a COVID-19 vaccines become available to the pediatric community, with a focus on vulnerable communities.

During the period of April 2020 to January 2021, the PMC achieved the following: 1,438 medical visits with 1,092 -- patients. More than 678 encounters by the mental health counselor. Social services for nearly 1,700 children. Twenty-one immunization

The Paradise Found Network or PFN, is a group of local community funders that have come together to share ideas and provide updates on each of the Racial, Equity Diversity and Inclusion, REDI, efforts. The Children's Trust is using Paradise Found to refer to its REDI Social and Emotional Wellness, SEW, and Continues Learning Quality Improvement, CLQI, initiatives. These initiatives are being defined, developed and rolled out in unison to ensure for greatest impact.

Paradise Found efforts can be grouped into three categories mentioned previously. The first supports for mental health and SEW that are critical to advancing Ready Wellness and Training. The second is ensuring children's basic needs are met, is a foundational requirement for success. And the third is increasing awareness about the work and investments of The Children's Trust and how the work is accomplished through our policies and procedures.

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Now, you will have seen an extensive overview on pages 50 to 52 on your packet of the framework. And I'll just very briefly highlight that the UM's Mailman Center for Child Development Department of Pediatrics will develop an SEW framework and accompanying implantation supports with Trust staff, provider staff, and program participants. A collaborative work group comprised of Trust executive and senior management staff, Trust CLQI staff, Trust academy, contracted providers and REDI consultants will shepherd development of this work, starting with establishing a common language and a culturally humble guide to SEW. And again, you can see the full framework in your packet over on pages 50 to 52.

Further discussion, feedback from our committee, please?

MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: I have some feedback. I want to commend our staff on this resolution. And I want to just state as a practitioner, as a school psychologist, as a clinician, as someone who believes in proactive measures, that I am so ecstatic, you have no idea, to see this type of resolution.

Emotional, social-emotional, wellness, mental, health wellness, wellness is something that I think we definitely want to promote and advocate. It's

extremely important.

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While it's important to intervene, because I believe a lot of the services that we provide in our community are interventions, but prevention is just as important. And also, creating and maintaining wellness. We don't want people to think that the only time children and families should receive services as if there is something negative happening in their life. Because there is a lot of positive and we want that to be maintained. And wellness, in general, that is what that is about. families and children and communities that are well to continue to be well and then some that may struggle with wellness, per se, that we get them on track to wellness. This is, to me, this is huge. I just want to say thank you so much.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Tiombe.

DR. BAGNER: Yeah, I wanted to highlight that comment. Reading this, I was very impressed. It's innovative, it's very important. I think it's wonderful that it's going to move forward. And I think this I just a great initiative.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Thank you.

MS. NEASMAN: I also want to echo the comments

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that were made and really congratulate Jim and staff, and Stephanie on this resolution. It's way out of the box thinking. It's something that I know they've been thinking about for years and how they brought it together with the other groups, and look at the grants, it's just amazing and outstanding, so I totally support and look forward to where we're going to be in another year or two with this initiative.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, thank you for that.

DR. DAGNER: I'll just jump in with the enthusiasm. I agree wholeheartedly and I think this is, hopefully this is the first of many steps towards these efforts. It's an important first step, but I think we have a lot of work to do as talked about during our Ad Hoc ready meetings. So hopefully this is a first of many, many steps.
