2	(Recording of the meeting began at 3:30 p.m.)	
3	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Good afternoon, everyone,	
4	and welcome to, on this July 1, to our July Program	
5	Services and Childhood Health Committee meeting.	
6	It's my great pleasure to see all of you live and in-	
7	person today. And welcome to all of you as you	
8	prepare for what I hope will be a fun July 4th	
9	weekend.	
10	Muriel, do we have any public comments today?	
11	MS. JEANTY: Madam Chair, we don't have any	
12	public comments.	
13	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Very well. Thank you so	
14	much. And so let's proceed to the approval of the	
15	minutes for our last meeting. Committee members, by	
16	now you would have had an opportunity to review the	
17	minutes from our June 3rd meeting.	
18	May I have a motion to approve the minutes?	
19	DR. ABRAHAM: So moved, Abraham.	
20	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Dr. Abraham.	
21	MS. DONWORTH: Second, Donworth.	
22	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Mary.	
23	All those in favor?	
24	ALL: AYE.	
25	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The	

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1	minutes are approved.	
2	We have three resolutions on the schedule today.	
3	And for the reading and discussion of the first	
4	resolution I'm going to pass the baton to Karen	
5	Weller. Karen?	
6	MS. WELLER: Okay. Good afternoon, everyone.	
7	Resolution 2021-A: Authorization to amend	
8	resolution number 2021-28, approved by the board on	
9	March 15, 2021 to authorize(1) a contract amendment	
10	with the Early Learning Coalition of Miami-	
11	Dade/Monroe (ELC) to increase funding for Thrive by 5	
12	child scholarships, in an additional amount not to	
13	exceed \$1,500,000.00, for a new total of	
14	\$11,500,000.00, and (2) the encumberance of an	
15	additional \$500,000.00 via a purchase order for high-	
16	quality tiered payment differentials for a new total	
17	amount of \$10,500,000.00, both for a term both of	
18	these for a term of 15 months, commencing July 1,	
19	2021, and ending September 30, 2022, subject to	
20	annual funding appropriations.	
21	May I have a motion, please?	
22	MS. BENDROSS-MINDINGALL: So moved, Bendross-	
23	Mindingall.	
24	MS. GIMENEZ: Second, Gimenez.	
25	MS. WELLER: Okay. Any recusals?	

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1	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Recuse, Hollingsworth, I	
2	work for the Early Learning Coalition.	
3	MS. WELLER: Okay, thank you. As we move into	
4	discussion, I just needed to let everyone know that	
5	this resolution is really you have in your packet	
6	a copy of the resolution 2021-28 for your review and	
7	your consideration. What we are approving today is	
8	adding the 1.5 million to the child scholarships. We	
9	currently have 842 children that are on the waitlist	
10	and parents are ready to go back to work and they	
11	need the high quality care for their children. We	
12	receive calls daily with parents asking for the	
13	support. And adding \$500,000 to the tiered payments	
14	to support the school readiness increases what had	
15	been put forth by the Office of Learning, which is a	
16	much needed subsidy payment rate that is kind of low	
17	here in Miami-Dade County.	
18	Do we have any other comments or requests?	
19	DR. BAGNER: If I may, Madam Vice Chair?	
20	MS. WELLER: Sure.	
21	DR. BAGNER: So just a comment that this is	
22	extremely important. The amount of money going	
23	towards those on the waitlist is just putting a small	
24	dent. I think it covers right under 200 kids. So I	
25	know we're waiting to see what the federal government	

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1	provides, but hopefully we can do more and get most	
2	of those 700 kids services that they need.	
3	MR. WELLER: Thank you. Any other comments?	
4	MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: I have a question, but I	
5	think Stephanie may be in the process of answering	
6	it. I know this is a resolution to approve	
7	additional funds, but I wanted to learn or better	
8	understand the differences between the five tiers.	
9	Because I know I guess there's differences between	
10	the quality. And then I told her I wanted to know	
11	what the ethnic and racial background of the children	
12	attending the tier four and five, which, I guess, are	
13	the higher quality pair, so.	
14	MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, if I may, I'm going to	
15	ask Rachel to answer. Tiombe, some of that we have	
16	for you, some of that's going to need to wait until	
17	next week. We'll have it before the board meeting.	
18	But just so all the board members are well aware that	
19	our Thrive By 5, when we did pivot, all our providers	
20	in Thrive By 5 are in high need neighborhoods	
21	throughout the high census tracts.	
22	So, Rachel, do you have I know we have a	
23	partial answer for Tiombe's question.	
24	MS. SPECTOR: WE do have the ethnic and racial	
25	breakdown for all the children that are either	

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1	participating in the scholarship program or on the
2	waitlist. The rest of the children that are
3	attending the four and five program, I have already
4	reached out to Evelio at the Early Learning Coalition
5	to get that data as well. So hopefully next week
6	we'll be able to share it all with you.
7	And then, regarding your question about the
8	differences in tiers, so we used the class tool,
9	which measures the interactions between children and
10	educators, and then we assess 50 percent of the
11	classrooms by tier level, so 50 percent of infant, 50
12	percent toddler, 50 percent Pre-K. And then we have
13	a composite score which is essentially an average of
14	all the different dimensions. And that's what
15	separates the tiers.
16	So a tier 5, the class is a 7 point tool, so a
17	tier 5 is a 6.01 to 7, it's extremely, like, it's a
18	very, very high score. We use that tool because the
19	some of the domains instructional support are
20	linked to better off child outcomes in terms of
21	school readiness. But I can also send you the exact
22	breakdown of the tiers, if that will be helpful.
23	You're welcome.
24	MS. WELLER: Is there any other comments or
25	questions?

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1	MS. GIMENEZ: I have a question, Madam Chair,
2	what happens to the children that remain on the
3	waitlist, are there other options available for them?
4	MS. SPECTOR: Well, not at this time. I mean,
5	there's no other funding. We'll see with the
6	American Rescue Plan, there is going to be some funds
7	coming down for parents to pay. A lot of families
8	that are on the waitlist are paying right now, right,
9	they don't have a choice, they have to work. They're
10	paying, but it's extremely difficult for them. I
11	speak to mom's that are just trying to make it work
12	and they keep calling, I can't afford \$600, \$700 a
13	month per child.
14	And so but they remain on the waitlist. So
15	yeah, we're working through the waitlist. We do
16	expect that when the summer ends and children
17	transition to kindergarten, we'll have additional
18	I think we have close to 100 children that are
19	transitioning to kindergarten, so that will open up
20	another 100 slots. But yeah, we try to assist, but
21	there's not really any other funding at this point.
22	MS. GIMENEZ: Thank you.
23	MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, if I may. The state and
24	the feds, there's a lot money coming down. Right now
25	there's over one billion dollars sitting at the state

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1	level. And as of today, we all just moved under the	
2	Department of Education. So there should be	
3	guidance. And the nice thing is we have a spot at	
4	the table with Michelle Ovelio from the ELCs at that	
5	table, looking at where this money goes, knowing	
6	that's going to function at`1 three years, so how do	
7	we use that money wisely to start building	
8	infrastructure.	
9	So we're waiting until that comes out, and then	
10	we want to reconvene an early childcare workgroup for	
11	this board. But just to see what's coming from the	
12	state and feds first, and then we kind of look	
13	holistically at what our investments are, are there	
14	things that we need to pivot on, or are there things	
15	that are coming down the pipe. So we're hoping	
16	sometime in the next six months, the next month or	
17	two we'll have the guidance from the state and the	
18	feds, and then we can reconvene the childcare	
19	workgroup.	
20	DR. BAGNER: I do just have one more question.	
21	remind us how much of the day these scholarships	
22	cover. I know we've had this discussion way back, I	
23	can't remember if it's a full day until five or if it	
24	doesn't include aftercare. And I think if not,	
25	that's something important we want to consider as we	

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1	think about the funding.	
2	MS. SPECTOR: No, the scholarship covers a full-	
3	time slot. So typically the programs are open 10	
4	hours a day, it covers the whole slot. And the	
5	payment is, there's a parent copayment of \$70 a week,	
6	which is right above the threshold of the highest	
7	copayment if you qualify for the school readiness	
8	federal childcare subsidy. And then the only time	
9	our scholarship covers half is for the 4-year-olds	
10	that participate in VPK, then we pay the wraparound	
11	rate so they can stay the whole day.	
12	DR. BAGNER: All right, thank you.	
13	MR. HAJ: Rachel, just for the benefit of the	
14	group and perhaps new board members, can you just	
15	talk about the poverty threshold and where we're at	
16	for our scholarships?	
17	MS. SPECTOR: The income requirements?	
18	MR. HAJ: The 150 percent to 300.	
19	MS. SPECTOR: Yeah, so in order to qualify for	
20	the federal childcare subsidy through the school	
21	readiness program, families are able to earn up to	
22	150 percent of the federal poverty rate. And then	
23	upon renewal, which is every two years, they're able	
24	to go up to 200 percent of the federal poverty rate.	
25	Our scholarships cover those families of the 300	

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1	percent of the federal poverty rate. So these are	
2	families that are making like \$12, \$13, \$14, \$15 an	
3	hour, that don't often times, you know, we have	
4	people, I've spoken to women who turned down job	
5	career opportunities to bring themselves better	
6	incomes on a path of self-sufficiency because they'll	
7	lose their childcare subsidy if they earn too much	
8	money. So these are those families. This is	
9	supporting a family of three that's making up to	
10	about \$60,000, remember the cost of childcare is very	
11	expensive, so these are families that are barely	
12	making it.	
13	MS. WELLER: Any other questions? Okay. All	
14	those in favor?	
15	ALL: AYE.	
16	MS. WELLER: Opposed? The resolution carries.	
17	Back to you, Madam Chair.	
18	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Madam Secretary.	
19	Resolution 2021-B: Authorization to negotiate	
20	and execute contracts with six providers, identified	
21	herein, and selected following a competitive	
22	solicitation for early childhood community-research	
23	demonstration projects within high-need communities,	
24	in a total amount not to exceed \$1,939,358.00, for a	
25	term of 12 months, commencing October 1, 2021, and	

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1	ending September 30, 2022, with four remaining
2	contract renewals.
3	May I have a motion, please?
4	MS. BENDROSS-MINDINGALL: Bendross-Mindingall,
5	move it.
6	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, ma'am, and a
7	second?
8	DR. ABRAHAM: Second, Abraham.
9	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any
10	recusals? I don't know if Constance Collins is with
11	us today, but I do have a recommendation for recusal
12	from Constance. Any other recusals?
13	DR. BAGNER: Recusal, Bagner, I know it's not a
14	legal recommendation, but I do work closely with one
15	of the consultants on the resolution because I'm
16	employed by FIU with him.
17	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: All right, thank you, Dan.
18	And let's move into discussion. In a brief overview,
19	the early childhood community research demonstration
20	project, as you will recall, focused on implementing
21	and evaluating programs with high need populations
22	and underserved communities across Miami-Dade County
23	to support early childhood development.
24	On March 8, 2021, The Trust issued request for
25	proposals and that was RFP number 2021-06 to fund

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1	active community research partnerships. The intent	
2	here is to use community-based participatory research	
3	frameworks focused on implementing and evaluating	
4	evidence-based practices or promising practices that	
5	support early childhood development within high need	
6	communities.	
7	Eleven applications were received and reviewed.	
8	The comprehensive review process included an	
9	independent program and application rating by three	
10	trained reviewers. A review team debriefing, a	
11	fiscal audit review, and an initiative wide review.	
12	Six applications are today being recommended for	
13	funding. This is the second cycle of the early	
14	childhood research demonstration projects. There are	
15	four projects which are continuing from the previous	
16	cycle by significantly changing the research	
17	questions and offering a different intervention.	
18	We have two brand new projects in this cycle.	
19	This RFP was extremely competitive. We received far	
20	more proposals than we could fund. We were, however,	
21	able to add \$200,000.00 from Help Me Grow, since	
22	nobody applied for that particular solicitation.	
23	Further discussion, questions, observations from our	
24	committee?	
25	MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: I just have a comment about	

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1	the one that's, FIU's black mother care plan. I		
2	just, you know, I read through all of these, I think		
3	they're all phenomenal and great. In particular,		
4	this one I was very happy to see. I'm sure that		
5	everyone is aware of the health disparities and many		
6	places in our country, including our community, with		
7	people of African-American descent, but including		
8	black women.		
9	This is, I think its huge, because it is a huge		
10	problem across the country. The services and		
11	healthcare that black woman that are in the process		
12	of giving birth or when they're pregnant, this is		
13	I just wanted to say thank you for having this here.		
14	And then, also, I saw one, I think, that deals with		
15	the multitiered system of supports and educating		
16	children and adding the piece with the social-		
17	emotional. Again, I think they're all great, but		
18	those two just stand out for me, especially for the		
19	mothers, the black mothers.		
20	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you for that, Tiombe.		
21	Committee members, further input?		
22	Hearing none, all those in favor?		
23	ALL: AYE.		
24	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?		
25	The resolution carries. Our final resolution of		

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1	this afternoon
2	DR. BAGNER: Madam Chair, if I may?
3	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, is that Dan?
4	DR. BAGNER: Yes. I know I have to I had to
5	recuse myself but I do want to speak about the
6	resolution after the vote. I can't emphasize enough
7	how proud I am of The Trust for doing this work. We
8	met, an early childcare workgroup, I think five years
9	ago now, to start this. These projects are so
10	exciting. It's really combining, providing important
11	early childhood services with actually conducting and
12	evaluating the effectiveness of the programs that
13	they're using. And I hope we can do more of this.
14	I'm excited to see the results. We've had a couple
15	of exciting presentations where we saw results from
16	previous of these demonstration projects. So kudos
17	to the staff for continuing to do this work.
18	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, thank you, Dan. I
19	couldn't agree more. Thank you for your ongoing
20	support and enthusiasm surrounding the demonstration
21	projects.
22	Let's move on to Resolution 2021-C.
23	MS. KOBRINSKI: Madam chair, just a second.
24	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes?
25	MS. KOBRINSKI: Can you check your agenda

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1	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Is somebody I can't hear			
2	you.			
3	MS. KOBRINSKI: I'm just checking it's Leigh			
4	Kobrinski. I'm just checking on the title of that			
5	last resolution. Does it say 2021-B?			
6	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: B.			
7	MS. KOBRINSKI: Okay.			
8	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: We're going into 2021-C now,			
9	our final resolution.			
10	MS. KOBRINSKI: Okay, just clarifying for the			
11	record that it was 2021-B. I think there was a typo			
12	on the agenda item itself. Thank you.			
13	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you for that. And if			
14	I misspoke, I apologize.			
15	Resolution 2021-C: Authorization to negotiate			
16	and execute a contract with Florida Introduces			
17	Physical Activity and Nutrition to Youth (FLIPANY)			
18	for after-school snacks and meals, in a total amount			
19	not to exceed \$600,000.00, for a term of 12 months,			
20	commencing October 1, 2021, and ending September 30,			
21	2022, with four remaining contract renewals.			
22	May I have a motion, please?			
23	MS. GIMENEZ: So moved, Gimenez.			
24	MR. DUNN: Second, Richard Dunn.			
25	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any			

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1	recusals? I don't have any recommended recusals				
2	here. Calling for recusals. Hearing none, let's				
3	move into discussion.				
4	Committee members, if you are aware, The				
5	Children's Trust requires all afterschool and summer				
6	programs to provide participating children with food				
7	that meets the United States Department of				
8	Agriculture, or USDA, nutrition program requirements.				
9	On February 8, 2021, The Children's Trust released				
10	requests for qualifications, that's RFQ number 2021-				
11	05, for one agency to act as the afterschool meals				
12	program food sponsor. One application was received,				
13	reviewed and recommended for funding.				
14	A comprehensive review process included an				
15	independent program operation rating by three trained				
16	reviewers, a review team debriefing and a fiscal				
17	audit review. FLIPANY has been providing snacks and				
18	meals to Trust funded providers since June 2015. Now				
19	during the first eight months of the current				
20	contract, FLIPANY has provided 25,488 snacks to				
21	pardon me, and 9,481 suppers and lunches, which				
22	resulted in \$60,031.10 in leverage federal				
23	reimbursements. And received positive reviews form				
24	cite staff who indicated students were overall				
25	extremely satisfied with their food choices. The				

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1	afterschool staff is also extremely satisfied with	
2	snack delivery and quality.	
3	Discussion, feedback from the committee, please?	
4	MS. GIMENEZ: I have a comment. I think it's	
5	great that The Children's Trust also pays for those	
6	snacks, meals and beverage, et cetera, when they do	
7	not meet the DOH requirements. And I also think that	
8	having additionally, some of these cites provide	
9	supper for the children, is also great. We all know	
10	that a child that has a good nutrition is able to do	
11	better work in school on the day of or the next day.	
12	So I do commend them for doing this.	
13	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you for that, Lourdes.	
14	Further comments from our committee? Hearing none,	
15	all those in favor?	
16	ALL: AYE.	
17	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The	
18	resolution carries. And committee members, that's	
19	our final resolution of the day. I'm punting to Jim	
20	for the CEO report.	
21	MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, thank you. I just want	
22	to let everyone know, I know the Surfside is on the	
23	top of everybody's mind and how this community is	
24	rallying around, I think we have tremendous amount of	
25	support. And just like when there's any other	
	1	

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1	tragedy, this community steps up. We have been we
2	sent an email to the board, we have been coordinating
3	with our providers in that area. And I was telling
4	Dan a little while ago, we are concerned now, but
5	we're also concerned in two months when the media
6	leaves and then those families have a long-term
7	effect and how are we going to be there.
8	So we started a crisis page for help with all of
9	our providers and we'll continue updating that. We
10	are in constant communications with, again, our
11	providers there, as well as United Way and other of
12	the funders, and how are we going to be thoughtful of
13	how we do this. We have professionals who do do it,
14	so how are we going to coordinate efforts, also be
15	culturally sensitive. We talked about the orthodox
16	community and some other things going on in there.
17	But we have our continued support to work alongside
18	to support this community, not just this week and
19	next week, but for the years ahead.
20	Preliminary budget, this morning the Finance
21	Committee met, as you know, this month, July, the
22	next board meeting the board will vote on a millage
23	and budget approval to go to the TRIM meeting. They
24	did approve the half millage rate and approved the
25	budget. The half millage rate does allow us, if the

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1	board does vote for it in July, to fund the board
2	priority items that came out of the board retreat.
3	So you will see that, that will be the top of your
4	discussion first up at the board meeting the
5	following Monday.
6	Champions for Children, this is our big event.
7	The Dave Lawrence Award as well as our providers of
8	the year. Those of you who have helped judged in the
9	past, you know the difficult job judging because
10	you've got phenomenal people applying. We have many
11	board members who have signed up to be judges. It's
12	July 7th, I believe, at 3:00. So if you have not
13	signed up and you want to participate in voting for
14	our David Lawrence Champion as well as provider of
15	the year and some others, please do so.
16	And TRIM I and II, are exceptionally important
17	that we need a full quorum of September 13 and 20.
18	And other than that, I'd just like to wish everybody
19	here and their families a wonderful Fourth of July.
20	Thank you, Madam Chair.
21	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Jim. Thank you
22	for that.
23	MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, I'm sorry, one more, we
24	had a beautiful picture of Pastor Dunn. Thank you
25	for there was a picture of Pastor Dunn leading the

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1	first responders in prayer at Surfside that we will			
2	be posting on social media. But we talked about the			
3	faith-based community coming out and support what's			
4	going on. It was great to see one of our board			
5	members out there and leading some efforts. So,			
6	Pastor Dunn, thank you.			
7	MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: That's wonderful. Thank			
8	you, Pastor Dunn. Thank you, Jim. Thank you			
9	committee members for your kind attention today.			
10	Thank you to staff and guests for attending. And			
11	with that, folks, we are adjourned. So wishing			
12	everybody a happy Fourth of July and look forward to			
13	seeing you at the board meeting.
