The -- the website had a lot of information but it didn't have all the information. I should not go on the website and they're -- and they're saying they have research and then they have a one page, or two pages, and then they have a bunch of -- of -- of articles they've cited.

I have a concern about that. That's just plain background of training. We have to still be careful because someone can have research and it could be evidence -- they can say evidence based, but you have to really look deep into the research.

I did see one study that concerned me. Like it was 120,000 children, a very small percentage of the children, the end for that was -- they spent I think the majority of the children in this particular county that they spent.

So that -- that's one piece that concerned me. I think -- so just but we need more time to be able to review the research so we can really make an informed decision. I

And -- and so, you know, we -- we kind of started working our way down the list with the biggest ones, with the most contact, with the most dollars. And so this was one of the ones sort of more coming -- the -- this is the last batch of recommendations that you're getting.

So, you know, normally the process would be, you know, when you're approving the release of the funding that's really when you should be saying, should we be funding this.

And then this is sort of the part of you put out the funding. People have applied.

You've -- we've analyzed the -- the proposals and this is the recommendation that we're making for who should get funding to do the work. So I -- and -- and -- and we -- we have done significant work, I would say on staff's side, looking at what are the options for a formative assessment which is sort of a marker of a high quality early child -- early learning program.

We, you know, we don't -- we -- we know we want the early childhood staff to know about early childhood development and what

supports children. But we also want them to be able to look at individual level kids and document where they all are.

So if I'm at infant room and ideally I only have four babies or, maybe for some, six babies that I'm taking care of I sort of where each one is in their -- in their developmental domains and I'm able to structure their environments and their interactions throughout the day to support to support their individual -- individual development.

There's only a -- there's -- so that's sort of an element of what makes a quality program that ties into your approval of our tiered reimbursement model that we shifted to this year where, at the highest levels to get the highest payment differential of quality you have to be doing this.

You have to be doing formative child assessment. So then the state has said, here is a -- here are the systems that you can use to do formative child assessment. And so we really took on looking at those -- looking at those different options.

We spent a lot of time with our -- with
