## 1 PROCEEDINGS

2 (Recording of the meeting began at 3:30 p.m.)

3 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Welcome to the Program  
4 Services and Childhood Health Committee meeting. It's  
5 good to see all of our providers here today. We'd  
6 like to welcome you as well.

7 Muriel, do we have any public comments?

8 MS. JEANTY: No public comments.

9 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay, very well. Let's move  
10 on to the approval of the October 10, 2019 Committee  
11 meeting minutes.

12 Committee members, you had an opportunity to  
13 review the minutes. May I have a motion to approve?

14 MS. DONWORTH: So moved, Donworth.

15 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Second?

16 MS. LEICHTER: Second, Leichter.

17 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: All those in favor?

18 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded  
19 with "aye.")

20 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Opposed?

21 The minutes are approved.

22 We're bringing to you today several match funding  
23 resolutions as well as some contract renewals for  
24 summer care. I just want to remind you in regard to  
25 the match funding resolutions, as per the procurement

1 policy, the negotiation and execution of a match  
2 contract are exempt from the competitive procurement  
3 process.

4 And with that, I'm going to turn to Ms. Weller  
5 for the first two resolutions.

6 MS. WELLER: Good afternoon, everyone.

7 The first resolution is Resolution 2020-A:  
8 Authorization to negotiate and execute a contract with  
9 the Early Learning Coalition of Miami-Dade/Monroe  
10 (ELC) for match funding for the state of Florida Child  
11 Care Executive Partnership (CCEP) grant, in a total  
12 amount not to exceed \$1,230,000.00 for a term of 12  
13 months, commencing July 1, 2020, and ending June 30,  
14 2021.

15 May I have a motion?

16 MR. BAGNER: So moved, Bagner.

17 MS. GIMENEZ: Second, Gimenez.

18 MS. WELLER: Any recusals?

19 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Recusal, Hollingsworth. I  
20 work for the Early Learning Coalition.

21 MS. WELLER: Any discussion?

22 All those in favor?

23 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded  
24 with "aye.")

25 MS. WELLER: Opposed?

1 The motion carries.

2 Resolution 2020-B: Authorization to negotiate  
3 and execute contracts with the Early Learning  
4 Coalition of Miami-Dade/Monroe and the United Way of  
5 Miami-Dade for match funding for the federal Early  
6 Head Start- Child Care Partnership (EHS-CCP) grant, in  
7 a total amount not to exceed \$1,000,000.00 for a term  
8 of 12 months, commencing August 1, 2020, and ending  
9 July 31, 2021.

10 May I have a motion?

11 MS. GIMENEZ: So moved, Gimenez.

12 MS. WELLER: Second?

13 MS. PEREZ: Second, Perez.

14 MS. WELLER: Recusals?

15 MS. DONWORTH: Donworth, I work for United Way.

16 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Hollingsworth, I work for the  
17 Early Learning Coalition.

18 MS. WELLER: Any discussion?

19 Hearing none, all those in favor?

20 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded  
21 with "aye.")

22 MS. WELLER: Opposed?

23 The motion carries.

24 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Karen.

25 Resolution 2020-C: Authorization to negotiate

1 and execute a contract with the United Way of Miami-  
2 Dade for match funding for the federal Early Head  
3 Start-Child Care Partnership (EHS-CCP) grant, in a  
4 total amount not to exceed \$420,000.00 for a term of  
5 12 months, commencing August 1, 2020, and ending July  
6 31, 2021.

7 May I have a motion, please?

8 MS. WELLER: So moved, Weller.

9 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?

10 MS. LEICHTER: Second, Leichter.

11 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any recusals?

12 MS. DONWORTH: Donworth, I work for United Way.

13 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: As we move into discussion,  
14 just a few points to remind you that this TCT funding  
15 is used to leverage federal funding for high-quality  
16 early care and education slots for infants and  
17 toddlers through the Early Head Start Child Care  
18 Partnerships. You'll remember that Head Start was  
19 funding in 1965 to provide comprehensive educational  
20 and support services for low-income three and four-  
21 year-olds. And Early Head Start was added in 1994.

22 The Early Head Start Partnerships were added in  
23 2014 in an effort to improve Global Quality and add  
24 support services in private and public early learning  
25 settings.



1           There is a map inside of your packet so you can  
2 get a sense of where programs are located across the  
3 county.

4           Discussion or questions in regards to this  
5 resolution?

6           Hearing none, all those in favor?

7           (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded  
8 with "aye.")

9           MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Any opposed?

10          The resolution carries.

11          Resolution 2020-D: Authorization to negotiate and  
12 retroactively execute a contract with Miami-Dade  
13 County, Community Action and Human Services  
14 Department, for match funding for the federal Early  
15 Head Start-Child Care Partnership (EHS-CCP) grant, in  
16 a total amount not to exceed \$850,000.00 for a term of  
17 12 months, commencing November 1, 2019, and ending  
18 October 31, 2020, and amend the fiscal year 2019-20  
19 general budget by transferring \$850,000.00 to provide  
20 the match funding for this resolution.

21          May I have a motion, please?

22          MS. PEREZ: Moved, Perez.

23          MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?

24          MS. DONWORTH: Second, Donworth.

25          MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any recusals?

1 Moving into discussion.

2 Hearing none, all those in favor?

3 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded  
4 with "aye.")

5 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?

6 The resolution carries.

7 Resolution 2020-E: Authorization to negotiate and  
8 execute a contract with Redlands Christian Migrant  
9 Association (RCMA) for local match funding to draw  
10 down federal-state funds to subsidize child care for  
11 the working poor, in a total amount not to exceed  
12 \$102,000.00, for a term of 12 months, commencing July  
13 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021.

14 May I have a motion, please?

15 MS. GIMENEZ: So moved, Gimenez.

16 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?

17 MR. BAGNER: Second, Bagner.

18 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any recusals?

19 And as we move into discussion, this match for  
20 the Redlands Christian Migrant Association, RCMA, is  
21 match funding to draw down federal-state funds to  
22 subsidize child care for the working poor families.  
23 RCMA is a nonprofit, nonsectarian organization funded  
24 through public and private sources. RCMA provides  
25 quality child care and early education for children of

1 migrant and seasonal farm workers and rural and low-  
2 income families throughout Florida, although this  
3 match funding is exclusively for Miami-Dade County.  
4 And there is a map in your packets so you can get a  
5 sense of where the slots are located.

6 Any discussion, any questions?

7 Hearing none, all those in favor?

8 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded  
9 with "aye.")

10 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?

11 The resolution carries.

12 MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, may I make a point?

13 The five reso's that we just approved, just to  
14 highlight, the \$3.6 million that we approved in these  
15 five reso's will draw down over \$28,000,000 in  
16 federal-state funding to this community, so it's  
17 something that this Board should be exceptionally  
18 proud of.

19 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Jim.

20 Resolution 2020-F: Authorization to negotiate  
21 and execute contracts with eight providers, identified  
22 herein, to provide early intervention summer camp  
23 services for 635 children, birth to five years of age,  
24 in a total amount not to exceed \$2,217,499.00 for a  
25 term of six months, commencing March 1, 2020, and

1 ending August 31, 2020, with three remaining renewals,  
2 subject to annual funding appropriations.

3 May I have a motion, please?

4 MS. DONWORTH: So moved, Donworth.

5 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?

6 MS. WELLER: Second, Weller.

7 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any recusals?

8 MR. BAGNER: Bagner, recused. Employed by FIU.

9 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Other recusals?

10 I'm going to clarify that this is for six months.

11 And a reminder as we move into discussion, we're  
12 funding slots for 635 children ages birth to five.

13 And this summer program provides an intersection of  
14 the benefits of early intervention along with summer  
15 learning loss. There are eight agencies in this  
16 resolution. There is a dashboard attached for you to  
17 take a look at and that provides an overview of how  
18 these agencies have been performing in the area of  
19 fiscal health, staffing, data quality, and service  
20 delivery. And all eight programs are advancing or  
21 mastering in all performance areas with just one  
22 exception and that's one for data quality for United  
23 Cerebral Palsy.

24 And again, we've included a map in your packets  
25 so you can get a sense of where these slots are

1 located.

2 Discussion, further discussion from the  
3 Committee?

4 MS. PEREZ: On the last chart there, it says that  
5 service utilization for South Florida Autism Center,  
6 only 33 percent. But that's not -- is that on the  
7 next -- that's on the next one, okay.

8 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Further discussion?

9 All those in favor?

10 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded  
11 with "aye.")

12 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?

13 The resolution carries.

14 Resolution 2020-G: Authorization to negotiate  
15 and execute contract renewals with ten providers,  
16 identified herein, to deliver high quality summer camp  
17 services for 840 elementary school children, in a  
18 combined total amount not to exceed \$1,267,156.00,  
19 each for a term of up to six months, commencing March  
20 1, 2020, and ending August 31, 2020, for summer only  
21 programs, with three remaining annual renewals,  
22 subject to annual funding appropriations.

23 May I have a motion, please?

24 MS. DONWORTH: So moved, Donworth.

25 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?

1 MS. GIMENEZ: Second, Gimenez.

2 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And moving into discussion.

3 MS. PEREZ: My question was about the low  
4 percentage of utilization.

5 MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, if I may.

6 There our new funded provider and we did have  
7 some onboarding challenges. I'll let Rachel speak  
8 about that.

9 MS. SPECTOR: Yeah, they were newly funded, this  
10 funding cycle for us. And I actually went out to  
11 visit them with the program manager. And it's a large  
12 school that only serves children with autism. They  
13 serve a pretty severe population. They explain that  
14 the students are attending school from, they come from  
15 Florida City, all the way up to Deerfield Beach, and  
16 North Miami, Miami Lakes, North Hialeah. Being there  
17 first year, they have some recruitment challenges. In  
18 hindsight, I think that they didn't necessarily market  
19 the program correctly, they really marketed as a  
20 literacy focused program to parents who have  
21 exceptionally challenging behavior, so they feel that  
22 not as many people enrolled. They did serve the 22  
23 children that came consistently. And we have a plan  
24 in place for this year to, they're partnering with  
25 Miami-Dade County Public School ESE staff to recruit

1 families. They are presenting at various fairs. They  
2 also, being new, didn't realize that they could serve  
3 kindergarten students. So as they're accepting  
4 children into their school year program, they're going  
5 to offer them slots in the child care program, in the  
6 summer program as well. We also engage Project RISE  
7 to help with some alternative assessments, to be sure  
8 that the students are gaining. We're also working on  
9 restructuring their budget because they don't know in  
10 advance who's coming. They had a lot of children this  
11 summer that needed one-on-one aid. So that's the type  
12 of population they're serving. So we'll be watching  
13 them again this summer and helping them to make sure  
14 that they're improving in advance.

15 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Rachel.

16 MR. BAGNER: If I may? I had similar concerns.  
17 I know that the 22 children were served. They were, I  
18 think, contracted for 40, so just a little over half,  
19 which is very concerning. There is a lot of need for  
20 kids with autism, so I'm surprised that they couldn't  
21 find kids. I understand the circumstances, but them  
22 being a new organization, I wonder if anyone is here  
23 from the organization that could speak to us about how  
24 they -- are we contracting them to serve 40 kids  
25 again?

1 MS. SPECTOR: We are.

2 MR. BAGNER: If they served 22, I think maybe we  
3 should consider contracting them to serve less.

4 MS. SPECTOR: I just want to add, the other  
5 adaptation we're making for the program, the other  
6 thing that they mentioned was a barrier, is that it  
7 was a 10-week program. They didn't know when they  
8 first applied. They were under the assumption that  
9 they had to serve a 10-week program, so many kids --  
10 parents want a break during the summer after  
11 travelling from afar, so we agreed to reduce their  
12 program to eight weeks, which they think will help  
13 also bring families. I think that there's not a  
14 challenge to find the families, it's just that they  
15 didn't market and recruit in time for the summer. And  
16 parents, especially parents of children with special  
17 needs, are already making plans much earlier on in the  
18 year because it's not as easy, there's not as many  
19 options for summer camp. So we will be very hands-on  
20 with them and assisting and making sure that their  
21 enrollment is up this year.

22 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Rachel.

23 Any further discussion, questions?

24 MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: I have a question. We're on  
25 item G, correct? I want to make sure. So my question



1 goes to the area regarding how many children  
2 participating. So I would really like to have more  
3 information. I think in the past I've asked for this  
4 information. I'm not really sure if I've ever  
5 received it, but I would like to know what  
6 disabilities are represented here in all of these  
7 programs. I think it's important for us to know this  
8 information so we can kind of determine are there some  
9 children, or some disabilities overrepresented, are  
10 some unrepresented, but is there a pattern that we  
11 mostly see this kind versus that kind. But I think we  
12 really need to find out this information because it's  
13 very critical, in my opinion, to make sure all of the  
14 children in our community who have disabilities, which  
15 can vary, have an opportunity to participate in the  
16 programs.

17 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Tiombe.

18 Further comments?

19 All those in favor?

20 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded  
21 with "aye.")

22 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?

23 The resolution carries.

24 Resolution 2020-H: Authorization to negotiate  
25 and execute contract renewals with 17 providers,

1 identified herein, to deliver high-quality summer camp  
2 services to 1,520 youth, in a total amount not to  
3 exceed \$2,597,209.00, each for a term of six months,  
4 commencing March 1, 2020, and ending August 31, 2020,  
5 with three remaining renewals, subject to annual  
6 funding appropriations.

7 May I have a motion, please?

8 MS. WELLER: So moved, Weller.

9 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?

10 MS. COLLINS: Collins, second.

11 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any recusals?

12 MR. BAGNER: Bagner, employed by FIU.

13 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you.

14 And you'll note that the dashboard is also  
15 included for this resolution as well as the map that  
16 lays forth locations.

17 Discussion, questions?

18 MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: So I have a question. I  
19 wanted to know for the summer programs, is it  
20 possible, maybe for the previous years date or the  
21 last two or three years to kind of have a breakdown of  
22 the demographics of the children who participated in  
23 the summer programs. I'm just, in my mind, thinking  
24 have you looked at the demographics of the children in  
25 our community. Wanting to make sure that we're

1 dealing with proportionate numbers. And so that's my  
2 thought and thinking. It will be nice to know a  
3 possible, you know, male, female, broken down by  
4 racial groups, areas of the county. But just wanting  
5 to kind of get this information to ensure we're not  
6 dealing again with any overrepresentation or  
7 underrepresentation of any particular demographics of  
8 students.

9 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Tiombe. Duly  
10 noted.

11 Further discussion?

12 All those in favor?

13 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded  
14 with "aye.")

15 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?

16 The resolution carries.

17 And our final resolution for today, Resolution  
18 2020-I: Authorization for a procurement waiver for  
19 training and professional development services to fund  
20 the Florida International University (FIU) Center for  
21 Children and Families Miami International Child &  
22 Adolescent Mental Health (MICAMH) Conference to be  
23 held in Miami on February 5-7, 2020, inclusive of free  
24 admission for providers affiliated with The Children's  
25 Trust, in an amount not to exceed \$30,000.00.

1 May I have a motion, please?

2 MS. PEREZ: Moved, Perez.

3 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?

4 MS. GIMENEZ: Second, Gimenez.

5 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any recusals?

6 MR. BAGNER: Bagner, employed by FIU.

7 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you.

8 As we move into discussion, this is an  
9 outstanding cutting edge conference bringing in folks  
10 from around the country, focusing on evidence-based  
11 prevention and treatment intervention for mental  
12 health and educational problems in children as well as  
13 in adolescents. The Trust has been providing funds  
14 for the conference since 2011 with consistently  
15 positive benefits. And last years conference hosted  
16 186 Trust affiliated providers for more than 40  
17 organizations.

18 Discussion, comments?

19 All those in favor?

20 (WHEREUPON, the committee members all responded  
21 with "aye.")

22 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed?

23 The resolution carries

24 Jim, you're up for the CEO report.

25 MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, thank you.

1           There are two resolutions that we are working  
2 with the county's attorneys in our reports here to  
3 bring to the Board meeting in November, however, we do  
4 not have it ready yet. I know its dealing with sex  
5 trafficking. Coming off of our retreat, this really  
6 hasn't been an area that we have been investing in,  
7 but there was a lot of discussion at the retreat with  
8 the Super Bowl coming up in January. I've been  
9 working with the State Attorney's Office and Kristi  
10 House. And the State Attorney would like to really  
11 have things in place prior to the Super Bowl. Since  
12 we don't have a Board meeting in December, we're  
13 trying to expedite this and bring it to you in  
14 November. So you will be seeing it and then we will  
15 bring it to the Chair or the community that has the  
16 ability to bring it straight to the Board.

17           And then there's two events, the SEL, Social  
18 Emotional Learning Awareness, and Spooky Symphony,  
19 which was held the last two weeks. I know some of our  
20 Board members participated in each. If you did not go  
21 to Spooky Symphony, you missed our vice chair dressing  
22 up as Anna from Frozen as well as some other different  
23 costume changes. But we had a great attendance at  
24 both, so I do thank staff and the Board members who  
25 attended these two.

1 Thank you.

2 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Jim.

3 MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: Can I mention something, I'm  
4 sorry? I wanted to thank you for mentioning the issue  
5 regarding the human trafficking. The school district,  
6 well, all of the psychologists, and staffing  
7 specialists, there were three huge PD's related to  
8 this last week for much of the staff and the school  
9 district that work in the mental health sector with  
10 children. But I'm hoping, I want to say, because I  
11 was going to bring this up, that even after the Super  
12 Bowl leaves, I would hope that as a Board, that we  
13 look at this issue. Because this is really effecting  
14 a lot of the children in our county, grade 6 through  
15 12. And what's happening to some of these children,  
16 its heartbreaking. And so I'm just hopeful, I know  
17 Super Bowl is coming, that more awareness -- even when  
18 they leave, I'm hoping that we can continue the  
19 conversation and see how we can possibly make an  
20 impact because so many children, and they're so young,  
21 young ladies mostly, young girls are being impacted  
22 right here in Miami-Dade County.

23 MR. HAJ: Tiombe, thank you.

24 I may have misspoke. It's not just because of  
25 the Super Bowl, we are a destination city and this is

1 a problem in our community. We're using the Super  
2 Bowl kind of as a platform to build an awareness and  
3 that's the same going through that, some resolutions  
4 you'll see going forward.

5 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Jim.

6 With that, Committee members, staff, and guests,  
7 we are adjourned.

8 Thank you.


