In our new system we are offering professional development opportunities to all of the licensed early care and education programs in Miami-Dade County.

So since we are really focusing in deep in specific neighborhoods to improve quality to the rest of the community, we are offering opportunities so they'll be supporting them in -- in accessing the scholarships.

FERRADAZ: Just to piggy back that 5 questions. To piggy back on that question. 6 The Department of Children and Families 7 licenses these child care centers. 8 MS. SPECTOR: Yes. 9 10 MS. FERRADAZ: Would it be appropriate 11 when -- as we're, you know, interacting with 12 these centers, if we see them struggling in 13 different -- different areas or whatever. 14 They may need a licensing staffers where 15 they may, you know, be struggling in -- in -in an area they could use some assistance to 16 17 get referrals from our licensing staff. 18 MS. 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            MS. SPECTOR: So currently -- so the
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current contract is serving 440 children and they, every year, have come -- have met their numbers.

2.

In fact, this was one of the programs that we, when we were adding additional funds and we increased their numbers, we did so last year. So in this award they'll be serving an additional 80 children.

I don't have all the specific outcome data on hand, but I can send it to you. But we definitely did see a very high percentage. Because part of the contract is, they go back and they reach back and contact at least ten percent of the families every year since we started to look.

And I don't have the number but I -it's in the high 80's, low 90's percentage of
children that went on not to receive any -needing any special education services.

MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: And -- and for the kids do -- does The Trust look at the grades that the children earned once they get into -- I'm assuming they're going into kindergarten. They're going into kindergarten after this or pre-K?

MS. SPECTOR: Well it depends. So they could be served when they're three. They could be served when they're four. But they reach back for kids that are in kindergarten or -- or later grades.

But they don't look at grades. They look at whether they access special ed -- special education services.

MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: Okay.

MS. HANSON: And if I could just add to that answer. They -- they do that through contacting the family and asking them.

Through our -- our partnership with the school system and the -- the head start our part of the county and -- and The Early Learning Coalition, our -- our integrative data system work we've been working on, those are the kinds of policy questions that we would be able to track.

Like what kinds of early childhood experiences, before school entry, are associated with school success. So those are the kinds of things that we're -- we're working on from a cross-systems level to be able to look at.

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or three, kindergarten, and first, and second. 1 2 Are we looking at if these kids are making C grades or better which means they're 3 functioning in the average range or they're 4 5 not. So that would be -- I don't know if that can be done. 6 7 But I mean, if it can't it, you know, as far as I know you do all of the research. So, 8 you know, correlating the grades with, you 9 10 know, everything. So, you know. 11 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. 12 MR. BRANDON: I have --13 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Further comments? MR. BRANDON: I have another. 14 So T 15 noticed this is a county wide -- the geographic area it's listed as county wide. 16 17 University of Miami is located more central, 18 you know. 19 I'm curious how -- how they go about connecting with folks all over and 20 21 specifically, you know, the deep south area which is my area. 22 23 I'm just kind of curious how -- how --

how people access the program and -- and are

-- and are they represented from north to

24

south and east to west?

MS. SPECTOR: So actually they are like equally represented north and south. The way people access the program is through, either Early Steps or Fiddlers which is our birth to three system or our three to five system.

So that's a requirement. The -- these are children that have gone through the state funded system and they don't qualify for state funded services. And so they are like a direct referral from those systems in.

So no matter where the family lives they will be served. And they -- they do see some people in the Mailman Center but the therapists also go out to wherever it's most convenient, that's in our contract, wherever it's most convenient for the family.

So they could go to their home. They could go to their child care center. They could go to -- or come into the office, to an early steps office. Depending what's most convenient for the families.

MR. BRANDON: So these people -- this -- the -- the clients, the 520 students, children, are ear -- if they are kind of

earmarked early on in their development and 1 2. followed through. Is that what you're saying? MS. SPECTOR: So they could be referred 3 from, you know, their pediatrician, from a 4 5 child care program, the parent has concerns, to -- to the appropriate source which is Early 6 7 Steps or Fiddlers, to have evaluations that are funded through the state. 8 After that if they don't qualify because 9 10 you need to have a -- a -- a certain 11 threshold of a delay, if they're just under 12 we're serving people that are mostly ten to 29 13 percent delayed. They don't quite meet --14 they're not delayed enough, if you will, to 15 get the state services. Then, so they've already come through 16 17 that system. So no matter where you live --18 MR. BRANDON: Okay. 19 MS. SPECTOR: -- from -- from the south 20 you go to one, from the north you come 21 somewhere else. 22 MR. BRANDON: Okay. 23 MS. SPECTOR: And so they're all coming 24 through the same pipeline. But they -- this

Because we found out that that piece is critical if we're going to continue, if we start with the early learning. And I have a great component of our staff that's here.

Ms. Terry Rutherford who works at that early level, that early learning level.

And then we also have our high school component here, Mr. Sweat. We have community advocates that are with us, our college and career and then our health and wellness. So that whole listed component we're going to continue to -- to do that.

One of the components that -- it's -- it's a little pun but it's something we're tremendously excited about is on July 21st we're doing a kicking violence out of Liberty City kickball tournament. Now why would we do that? Absolutely.

Today -- today I could not get to

Charles Drew because there was a shooting in
the Pork and Beans. So that means we had to
shut down our summer program for the day, shut
the students in, because our students are
immediately affected and impacted.

1 So it is our charge to continue to kick 2. violence through education and programming through the Miami Children's Initiative. 3 Absolutely the, again the holistic approach is 4 to continue to build collaborations and to 5 build on our network. 6 7 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Further questions for Ms. Daniels? Marta? 8 DR. PÉREZ: Thank you. Not -- not for 9 10 Ms. Daniels. Thank you very much. But what 11 about our initiative, our -- our together for 12 children initiative, how does that play in? Because it seems like the shootings have 13 14 not subsided and we're putting all this money 15 I don't know how that can be addressed? MR. HAJ: I'll ask Vivian how it ties in with 16 17 Together for Children. But with the shootings-18 the last data we looked at, the numbers of 19 shootings have gone done. 2.0 DR. PÉREZ: They have? 21 MR. HAJ: Yeah. And we will pro -- we 22 can provide you that data. DR. PÉREZ: 23 Okay. 24 MR. HAJ: But the numbers have gone down 25 tremendously.

DR. PÉREZ: Okay. Will there be some 1 2. sort of -- of -- of a report soon, an update, about how that initiative is going? 3 MR. HAJ: Yes. Our Chair asked, I think 4 5 it was the last board meeting for that within the next couple months. 6 7 We have the data that was wrapped up. School year ended in June. We need to get 8 that data. But our investment, we'll go back to the entire portfolio, but our investment we need the data from the elementary school attendant data to bring that.

MS. BOHORQUES: And -- and we can have Morris Copeland from Juvenile Services

Department provide the data that --

MR. HAJ: Right.

MS. BOHORQUES: -- that Jim was speaking to. But I would also add that it -- it's a difficult topic because things are happening in the moment.

But we also want to address the -- the issue long term. And the together for children strategy, a lot of it is around the long term approach.

And really thinking around intervention at the early stage that allows for -- that -- that prevents these things from happening in the long term. So it's really handling both

of those sides of it. 1 DR. PÉREZ: Yes. But that was not, in a 2 way, how it was sold. We -- we didn't say, oh 3 we're gonna look at, you know, we're not 4 gonna -- we're not looking at it so long term. 5 I -- I get that, yeah like -- but everything 6 7 else in education and everything, you know. Sometimes when we say, well we're 8 9 looking at it long term, you know, people 10 would like to see, you know --11 MS. BOHORQUES: Sure. 12 DR. PÉREZ: -- a solid return on 13 investments and things like that. 14 MS. BOHORQUES: And -- and I think both 15 things are being addressed. But as you mentioned, our investment in the elementary 16 17 piece is really thinking of the long term 18 strategy and our partners are doing work to address the immediate. 19 20 And that's -- we could share both pieces 21 of data when do the -- the update. 22 DR. BAGNER: And to bring it back to 23 MCI, because I know it's -- I mean it's a --24 I'm -- I'm really glad that you brought that

point up because I -- yeah, no.

I -- I mean what I -- what I kind of wanted to just highlight and -- and ask for what your -- your thoughts are on how you're addressing this. But I think we see things like Parkland is an upper class community and this massive shooting.

And all of a sudden it gets all this -tons of media attention. And shootings are
happening every day, you know, well it's not
every day but -- but very often in Liberty
City and we don't hear about it.

So I'm wondering -- and that's really the critical issue, right? That -- those are the common -- that's the common gun violence that we need to address. So I'm wondering how the event, like the kickball event and other things that you're doing, are trying to -- to reduce that -- that gun violence?

MS. DANIELS: So to directly respond. First, I'm glad you brought it up in that way. If I may -- if I may share.

In May we did a press conference, a community press conference at the local level. And the media did not display the positive image that we had intended.

We wanted to share, through partnerships like this, that we were reducing the level of violence that our impact for a school like Charles Drew that's smack in the middle of Liberty City.

2.

That school has gone from an F school to a B school. And Principal Sands is giving direct credit to the services of after school tutoring wrap around services that we're doing.

So we're on the ground. We're -- we're on the ground in that regard inch -- impacting the lives. Because we believe that to change the -- the trajectory of a child is better than -- than to -- to repair a broken man.

And so if we continue to return that investment in regards to providing the quality services now to directly talk about the media impact that we're suggesting, we have projected coming soon a media press -- a -- a media forum to talk about how we change the narrative about Liberty City.

We want to portray the image of real Liberty City because I'm a product of Liberty City. I'm a graduate of Miami Northwestern.

I attended Charles Drew, Orchard Villa.

And so there are stories like mine that are very real but they're often not being portrayed in the media. And how do we change that? Through perception and through education. And so we do have a plan to address some of the larger components.

But we're going to continue to keep our boots on the ground through our community advocates, through our -- our programs, to address those students and those children in the area providing career and college opportunities.

We're doing our level best and that's why we're here to thank you for this opportunity to continue funding that we can continue to do this work.

DR. BAGNER: Okay.

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    presentation. This was the same presentation
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that was presented to you at last month -- it was last month -- we're in July, June's board meeting.

Finance committee looked at it again this morning. There were some minor changes. As you know, July 1 are the final numbers come in. So we tweaked it slightly. So from what we presented at last board meeting there were just three minor tweaks.

One being the military that went from .4410 to .4415, a very minor shift. Then there was two other changes. There was a reallocation of \$200,000.00 from innovation to cross-funder collaboration. That was just a correction where it should have been to begin with.

And then the last reso that you just approved for \$174,000.00, that is money that -- that Miami Beach gives us that we get back. So we just reflected that as revenue and expense. So that -- that was it.

So this will be -- the finance committee unanimously approved this this morning. This will be brought back to the board on Monday.

If the board approves this budget this is what

| we'll set with TRIM.

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And then on -- we have two TRIM dates already set and those are September 4th, and this has been a change as we talked last month. The first TRIM date will be Tuesday, September 4th and there will be a brief board meeting at 4:30 prior, and then TRIM starts at 5:01 on this date.

The second TRIM, Monday, September 17th starts at 5:01. And on one of these TRIMs, I believe the second TRIM, we'll also be taking our board picture there. And Madam Chair, that is it. Thank you.

MS. WEISS-NUELL: Can I say something?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Yes,
please.

MS. WEISS-NUELL: I just wanted to add something about the together for kids. I didn't want to continue it so we could finish the -- that resolution which had nothing to do with MCI specifically.

I did ask for an update because our piece, it was -- did have -- it had to do with truancy and -- or excessive truancy. And so we had a full, you know, school year. So I

did ask for an update.

2.

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But one piece I hope when -- when that presentation is made, because I also do think -- I think Miami-Dade County should do a whole some, you know, meeting on -- with everybody because no one ever hears the whole piece, but that has nothing to do with us. Yes?

MS. GRAVES: I just want to interject that the county does have a building safe for neighborhoods subcommittee and we met today.

I'm counsel for that subcommittee. And one of the considerations is a youth violence initiative.

And so at those subcommittee meetings, and the Vice Chair is the chair of the subcommittee, they talked about different ways to intervene and how the different programs at the county, the programs that The Trust funds and other municipalities may have, can work together to comprehensively cover the programs with what we have now, as well as identify outstanding needs and better ways to address those.

So it was -- the item was not heard today because we lost quorum. But it should

-- it is going to be waived, from what I hear, to the July 10th meeting. And so this is another program to work with groups within the community to address these needs.

2.

MS. WEISS-NUELL: So that's excellent, I think, to hear -- continue to hear everything that's happening around the county so that we can all, you know, work and collaborate together.

My specific question, I guess is -- or request is, which has to do a lot with the resolutions that we saw today and even with MCI with the, you know, cradle to career movement is, what -- I hope that there's some plan in place so -- so children that are identified in the, you know, prime, you know, middle school years or the -- the elementary school years that they are followed throughout their life.

So that once that they are identified, but that's outside of our scope, but are they -- do they -- are they continued to be followed? Because we like to think that that answer is yes. But clearly, the fact that there was even a need for, you know, these

specialized, you know, program and services to 1 look at it I think indicated that that isn't 2. 3 always happening. So I think that we have to include that 4 in -- in the work that we're doing so that we 5 It's no different than referrals that 6 7 are made, but then we don't follow up to find out if they actually happened, you know. 8 9 So the contract might say we can -- we 10 -- we have to do the referrals and so that's 11 where my responsibility ends. So I hope that 12 that can be part of the discussion or, you 13 know, or going forward something to make sure 14 that we don't lose kids and families as they 15 go past what our -- our, you know, work area 16 is. 17 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Lauren. 18 DR. PÉREZ: May I? 19 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, Marta. DR. PÉREZ: 20 I think part of it, part of 21 the -- how we move this -- this sort of path, 22 I quess is -- is that there are so many parts. 23 The -- the together for children, part 24 of it, the way it was, I think it was 25 presented was, how do we -- it -- how do we

keep children safe in the community. In other
words, how do -- how do we prevent these
children that are out playing to -- to be
shot.

Which is not really, at that -- it's not
really about the child. It's about the

community. And that we don't lose that part of it. Then we also have the part about well, you know, those people that are doing these bad things in the community, they were

children once and how do we avoid having them
become those children -- those adults in the

13 | future.

So that's the other part. And now, unfortunately, since we have been involved with this movement we had what happened in -- in -- in Broward which further compounds things because this is something else.

This is about people coming into the schools and doing bad things. And what do we do to prevent those kinds of -- when those people were children how did we prevent them there -- from -- that's a whole different.

And this is -- some are in affluent areas and now -- and some are in poor areas of -- it's

-- it's so many moving parts to it.

I would just like to say that, as far as the school shootings in Miami-Dade, I -- I think it's relevant that the emphasis right now, in all of the schools, in -- in -- in Tallahassee, it is about, you know, how much are we spending and -- and just having safety at schools.

And Miami-Dade, we have had a police department for many, many, many years and Broward did not. And we have paid the price because it's very costly to have a police department.

Not only -- sometimes, you know, the police departments, the policemen dealing with the unions, they -- they, you know, they're -- they want -- we have to be competitive. And, you know, sometimes we're playing -- paying police officers more than we are our teachers, and that's all whole other can of worms.

But Miami-Dade has been committed, and the board I guess, in -- I think it's been wise, we have taken out money, more than Tallahassee ever sent and -- for -- for school safety. And now all of a sudden Tallahassee

is sending money for school safety to our school district.

2.

The problem with that, that's very nice, except that now it's being sent to us as -- as a categorical. And that -- monies are being taken away from other areas. So, you know, we're -- we're back to that.

But again, I hope that the -- the monies that we are, you know, it's always very important that the monies that we're spending from The Children's Trust, just as the monies that we are spending from the school district, that -- that we make sure that it -- that we keep assessing it and making sure that is well spent. Thank you.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you.

DR. BAGNER: I'd just like to add a comment. At the risk of sounding like a broken record, but we -- you know, I -- I -- I don't want to get lost on the critical predictor of gun violence which is access to guns and dealing with gun safety.

So, you know, I -- I -- I keep on wanting to bring to bring it up. I know it's a third rail in politics and I know people

don't want to talk about it.

I think all the things that we're trying to do to improve social and emotional well being in young kids, and all the things that we're doing as part of MCI and as part of together for children, are excellent. But if we really want to make an impact on gun violence we need to do something about gun safety.

And I, you know, I -- whatever we can do at The Trust I, you know, I think -- I think I -- I would hope that a lot of our board would -- would support that.

DR. EYSSALLENNE: I second that.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Ladies and gentlemen we are adjourned. Thank you.
